A book sale offered many items along with our Volume V lesson books. Thank you to all who attended and helped with the organization of this wonderful event.

We have finished making updates to our webpage providing new and updated forms and instructions both written and in video form, as explained in the August Bulletin. As I was reviewing this new information, I was impressed with the ease and speed by which we can send messages and instructions to our members. I went to the first lesson book written in 1940, *Heart Throbs of the West Volume I*, p.181-184, and read about early communication options in the Valley. I learned the following:

- From 1847 until the fall of 1851, the only communication the pioneers had with the outside world was through new immigrants or returning missionaries.
- In 1851, the first contract to carry the mail between Salt Lake City and St. Joseph, Missouri, was for a stage coach to make the trip once a month. Later it ran twice a month. At about the same time, a stage line was established between Salt Lake and Sacramento, California.
- In 1854, Congress appropriated \$80,000 for a mail route between the Mississippi Valley and the Pacific Ocean. The service brought mail every 25-35 days. Mail delivered was usually 25 days to two months old.
- In April of 1860 the Pony Express was established, building 200 stations, buying 500 horses, and hiring 80 daring riders to

carry the mail. The first mail took four days from the west, and six days from the east to reach Salt Lake. These Pony Express riders were chosen for their bravery and coolness in moments of danger. This service was continued for 18 months until October of 1861, when the transcontinental telegraph was in operation.

In 2022, we can send messages to be received almost immediately with the touch of a key on a computer, except in the Pioneer Memorial Museum! I was in the Curator's office in the basement of our Museum requesting some information which was then sent to me by email. I ran up the stairs and into my office where I sat and waited about fifteen seconds for the message to appear. I then got another message from Kari Main, our curator, which said, "We now know that the speed of Ellen Jeppson is faster than the speed of email in the Pioneer Memorial Museum." Progress!

We hope you use the information that we send to you and provide on our website to answer your questions and provide training and materials. We appreciate our ancestors who pioneered the way to achieve the speed by which we can do this!

We know much of what our pioneer ancestors sacrificed for us. We show our appreciation, admiration, and love to them by emulating their lives and remembering their stories.

### FIRST ENCAMPMENT PARK CELEBRATION

The **First Encampment Park** had its 25th anniversary on July 16, 2022. Marker #509, "First Encampment in the Salt Lake Valley," is at this location. It was also a celebration of the 175th anniversary of the pioneer advance group entering the Salt Lake Valley. A memorial hike of 5.4 miles began at 6:30 a.m. at Donner Park (2770 East 990 South). There was a handmade handcart that was pushed and pulled by more than 20 people. Hikers carried flags honoring each pioneer that camped at this location. The hike followed Emigration Creek. Utah Sacred Harp singers sang songs the pioneers knew and Primary children also sang. Some of the volunteers and participants were at the dedication 25 years ago when it was dedicated by Elder M. Russell Ballard. Members of the DUP, SUP, Mormon Battalion, and their families, neighbors, and friends, came to celebrate.

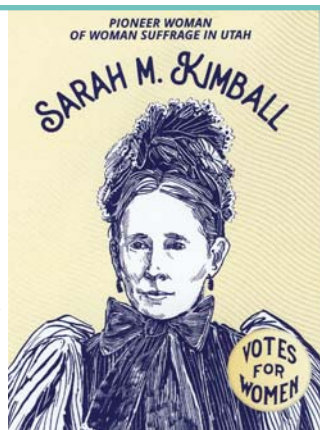

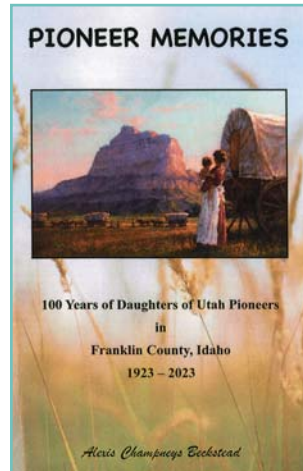

## 100 YEARS OF DAUGHTERS OF UTAH PIONEERS IN FRANKLIN COUNTY, IDAHO

The Franklin Company President, **Alexis Champneys Beckstead**, researched, wrote and published a book of the history of their Company titled *Pioneer Memories: 100 Years of Daughters of Utah Pioneers in Franklin County, Idaho 1923-2023*. The book is 436 pages of information about all the Franklin County DUP Company Presidents and Board Members, DUP Camp histories, with photographs, stories, poems, marker histories and dedications, historic events, relic hall information, a list of charter members, parades, encampments, DUP Conventions, Jubilees, outreach events, and meetings. It also includes a history of Oneida Stake and Oneida Stake Academy, community events, ghost towns, railroads, freighting, and war efforts. The 1930, 1976, and 2023 editions of the *Trail Blazer — a History of the Development of Southeastern Idaho* are included and much more!

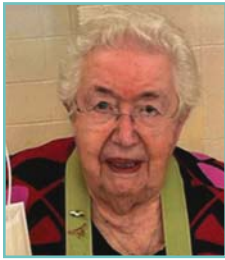

DUP member, **Elaine Olson Welch**, celebrated her 100th birthday on February 17, 2022, with family and close friends at an Open House in her home in Murray, Utah. Elaine had

He was listed on the company list of the John Riggs Murdock Company, who arrived in the Salt Lake Valley on August 19, 1868. Proving you are never too old to become a member of DUP, Elaine joined at age 96 along with her daughter, Donna Welch. Elaine, daughter Karen Welch Coleman, and granddaughter Alisha Coleman Gearhart are recipients of the Honorary Heritage Award Pin. Elaine is the oldest surviving grandchild of L. M. and Birdie Olson. Elaine's husband, Arza Huff Welch, was a long time member of Sons of Utah Pioneers. In 1995, Elaine was awarded the Pioneer Honor Award for Outstanding Service to the National Society of Sons of Utah Pioneers. Even prior to joining DUP, Elaine exemplified her commitment as "Keeper of the Past."

**GRAVESTONE CLEANING**

On May 7, 2022, a group of Morgan residents met at the South Morgan Cemetery for a demonstration of the proper methods for preserving and cleaning gravestones. The event was held in connection with National Preservation Month and in preparation for Memorial Day. The event was organized by Morgan DUP members. Amy Barry, Utah Cemeteries Program Manager from the Utah State History Department, gave the demonstration and provided useful information.

We should show our ancestors respect by caring for their gravestones. There are many gravestones in Morgan in need of care. One concern is some of the stones that were assembled with metal pegs, are no longer secure and in danger of tipping over.

Amy told us about the different types of stone used for gravestones in Morgan County and provided materials for the project. She had two types of cleaners for the different types of stone. After demonstrating the proper method for cleaning granite, several of the attendees gave it a try and found that hard water stains are not difficult to remove.
