The year 2021 has brought many wonderful experiences to Daughters of Utah Pioneers. Highlights of the year have been the dedications of new DUP Historical Markers and the rededications of markers that were repaired or replaced.

The first dedication was in January for Marker #590, "Bear River Massacre." This marker became part of an existing DUP monument near Preston, Idaho. On June 18, the program for Marker #589, "Old Flour Mill," in Fountain Green, Utah, was held in the historic city theatre. The guests then travelled to the monument site for the dedication. Marker #433, "Porterville," was rededicated on August 28 after being repaired, and the Morgan Museum addition was dedicated just a few miles away on the same day. On September 6, the dedication of Marker #588, "Fort Sanford," was held in Panguitch, Utah. September 25 brought two rededications — the first in Salt Lake for Marker #96, "Kennedy Ditch," and the second for Marker #54, "Old Tooele Ward Church." Both of these markers had been stolen. On October 9, Marker #73, "Pioneer Silk Industry," was recognized after refurbishing and repairs.

Each of these events provided unforgettable memories to guests of the camp and company hosts. President Henry B. Eyring of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints attended the "Pioneer Silk Industry" event and spoke about the great accomplishments of women who participated in the silk industry effort. His comments caused great emotion to those in attendance and evoked feelings of appreciation to our pioneer ancestors. Visiting the DUP monuments can bring these same feelings to those who stop and read about the people or events that were important to the pioneers. We know of many camps that take excursions to see DUP

markers. We have also heard of families who plan their vacations and outings to include visiting markers.

The process of memorializing the pioneers and their achievements in stone is humbling and gratifying. Daughters of Utah Pioneers care for 590 markers in twelve countries including: Canada, Denmark, England, Germany, Holland, Ireland, Norway, Scotland, Sweden, Switzerland, Wales, and the United States. Camps and companies watch over the markers in their areas, and many of them express gratitude for the privilege of cleaning, pulling weeds, or planting flowers at the sites. These markers help all of us remember sacrifices and contributions of those who came before.

My thoughts have been turned toward my ancestors. It is easy for me to be thankful for them, as the evidence of their good works is everywhere. During this season of gratitude and Christmas, my wish is that we may all feel joy as we celebrate with our families in the favorable circumstances we enjoy, in part, because of our forebearers.

We know much of what our pioneer ancestors sacrificed for us. We show our appreciation, admiration, and love to them by emulating their lives and remembering their stories.

She became a secondary teacher and taught in Murray and Granite School Districts and at the Frankfurt International School. She married Lynn Carson, whom she met at BYU. They have four children. Lynn worked for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Genealogical Society of Utah/Family History. JOHN LOWRY ARTIFACT DONATED TO MUSEUM

ALFRED M. DURHAM, MUSICIAN

Have you ever noticed the name **Alfred Durham** in our songbooks as a composer or arranger? I also saw his name many times in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints songbooks. It made me curious when I heard that many years ago the ISDUP asked him to be their official composer, and his first contribution was our theme song, "Daughters of Utah Pioneers" that is arranged from the old song "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp."

Alfred Morton Durham was born September 23, 1872, to Caroline Pedersen and Thomas Durham in Parowan, Utah. He was a faithful member of the Church and served a mission to Samoa. He married Margaret Anna Richards and had four sons and six daughters. They lived in Logan until 1920 and then moved to Salt Lake City in 1940. He continued to compose and arrange all his life and was well-known in both music and Church circles. He died October 22, 1957, and is buried in the Salt Lake City Cemetery.

He composed many songs including "Carry On," "For the Strength of the Hills," "Ode to Utah," and "Sweet is the Peace the Gospel Brings." He also arranged many other musical works.

NEW PINS FOR 2022

We are excited to announce that two new pins will be available for sale in 2022. The first is the demisemiseptcentennial pin commemorating the 175th anniversary of the arrival of the Vanguard Pioneer Company to the Salt Lake Valley in 1847. This pin was designed by Merrily Lau. The second pin is a redesign of the Tiffany Badge which was commissioned by the Jubilee Committee in 1897 and was presented to the surviving pioneers of 1847 by Governor Heber M. Wells. The original pin was designed by Tiffany & Company of New York. This redesigned pin will closely replicate the original pin with a few changes to make it more relevant to our day.

Three songs were sung by Lorrie Stark, one of which was written at the time the Museum was built and an overview was given of the 60 years that the Museum has shown caring and sharing to the town of American Fork. As the program closed, Laura Wigington played "Amazing Grace" on her bagpipes.

COMMEMORATION CEREMONY HELD FOR MARKER #73 "PIONEER SILK INDUSTRY"

The 80th Anniversary Commemoration of the Yalecrest DUP **Marker #73** was held October 9, 2021. President Henry B. Eyring, of the First Presidency of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints spoke at the ceremony.

In 1941, the Yalecrest monument was unveiled honoring the silkworm industry that flourished in Utah for nearly half a century. President Eyring acknowledged the tedious and labor-intensive work. Harkening back to those early silkworm pioneers, President Eyring said, "The Lord was purifying his people and strengthening their capacities. It was about the people having faith in a prophet of God to build Zion."

Zina Diantha Huntington Jacobs Young led the Deseret Silk Association while also serving as Relief Society President. Her great-great-granddaughter, Suzan Jacobs Lake, a member of the Yalecrest Camp, spoke at the event along with Ellen Jeppson, ISDUP President. The Marker was created by world-renowned sculptor Avarad Fairbanks. The monument rests on the grounds of the Yalecrest First and Second Wards at 1800 East Herbert Ave., the original location of a five acre mulberry tree farm with silkworm cocooneries.

Victoria Brinton was also installed as President of Salt Lake Parks Company.

MARKER #54 "OLD TOOEELE WARD CHURCH BUILDING"

Tooele City's Veterans Memorial Park was the site of a rededication ceremony for **Marker #54 "Old Tooele Ward Church Building."** The ceremony was held on Sept. 11, 2021, and was attended by city leaders, guests, and ISDUP and DUP representatives.

Constructed from 1854 to 1869, the walls of the church building were built with rocks from the mouth of Settlement Canyon. The church was demolished in 1968.

The Daughters of Utah Pioneers placed a marker on the building in 1940. In 1970, a monument was built that included the bell from the chapel's steeple on top of a brick column. The theft of the plaque from the monument was the reason for a new plaque and rededication ceremony. There are eight other markers in Tooele County.

Judy Schneider, President, Tooele County Company, welcomed guests. JoLynne Johnson, Chaplain, offered the opening prayer. Merna Dalton, ISDUP Assistant Marker Chair, gave remarks and Joel Dunn gave the dedicatory prayer.

MARKER #433 "PORTERVILLE" REDEDICATION



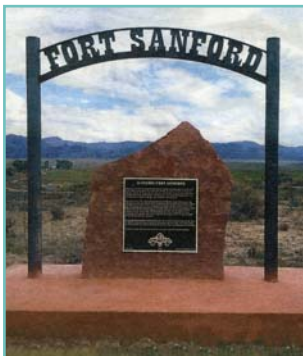
Marker #433 "Porterville"

Marker #433 was rededicated after restoration by the Eagle Scouts, under the direction of Gage Adams. Originally built in 1986, it was restored and rededicated on August 28, 2021.

Porterville was settled in 1857 by the Porter family. Sanford Porter, Sr., built a cabin in 1860. The monument was originally built in 1931 but not as it stands today. Morgan Company President, Claudia Nelson, welcomed guests to the ceremony. Bishop Aaron Rose of the West Porterville Ward

rededicated the Historical Marker. The Museum Meeting Room dedication was by Ernie Durrant.

MARKER #588 "FORT SANFORD"

MARKER #96 "KENNEDY DITCH"

On September 25, 2021, the Salt Lake Parks Company rededicated **Marker #96** "Kennedy Ditch" on the corner of 1100 East and 1700 South in Salt Lake City. Pam Carson, President of Belvedere Camp, gave a history of the marker and why it needed to be replaced. On June 1, 1947, the Marker was installed in front of the Emerson Ward. DUP members of the Emerson Camp wanted to honor the history of the first irrigation canal, or "ditch" in this area. It was part of the Centennial year-long celebration of the 100th year since the pioneers came to the valley.
