

The Days of '47 Royalty has been chosen with Queen Ellie Simmons from South Jordan, Utah; Attendant Megan Haynie from Perry, Utah; and Attendant Jacquelyn Bazinet from Lehi, Utah. Pictures and bios of these amazing young women can be viewed on the homepage at ISDUP.org.

In April of this year, we read of an earthquake with a magnitude of 5.2 that hit the area just outside of San Diego, California. As reports were telecast on news stations around the nation, a special video was shown from the San Diego Zoo recorded in the elephant enclosure. This video showed that as soon as they felt the shaking of the earth, the herd of African elephants rushed to the center of the enclosure and backed their bodies close together to form a protective circle around their young. Called the "alert circle," the elephants' natural response was to gather and protect the herd against a perceived threat. Ndula, Umngani, Khosi, Zuli, and Kmhaya instinctively knew they would be stronger together during this frightening event. None of them were hurt.

I have seen people gather together in a circle many times including: sports teams as they encourage each other and celebrate in victory or comfort in defeat; families, as Summer Issue • June 2025

they welcome new babies, show support and love, and bid farewell at the time of death; and friends, as they learn and grow together.

The pioneers also valued the strength of a circle. Each night they backed their wagons together in the form of a large circle, herding the most vulnerable animals into the center for protection. It was here that the pioneers could cook, wash, and sleep with safety.

As daughters of Utah pioneers we can also gather in a circle, whether figuratively or literally, to strengthen our Companies and Camps. With like-mindedness, compromise, and goodwill, the Society can grow, and be stronger together in meeting DUP goals and objectives.

I look forward to seeing many of you at our International Seminar/Convention on June 21 this year. Being together and learning more about DUP makes a bigger circle to give all of us strength and purpose.

We know much of what our pioneer ancestors sacrificed for us. We show our appreciation, admiration, and love to them by emulating their lives and remembering their stories.

She served a mission for her church. Megan is the daughter of Paul and Natalie Haynie from Perry, Utah.

Attendant Jacquelyn Bazinet is attending Brigham Young University majoring in marketing. She was an intern at a dolphin research center in Florida and lived in Puerto Rico working as a mother's helper for a family with ten children to earn money so she could serve a mission for her church. Jacquelyn is a ballroom dancer and has musical theater and vocal training. Food bank drives, Sub for Santa, and singing at assisted living centers are some of the ways she serves her community. Jacquelyn is the daughter of Jacque and Marilyn Bazinet from Lehi, Utah.

The trio was chosen during a scholarship competition held on March 29th at the Pioneer Memorial Museum in partnership with Days of '47, Inc. They were selected by a panel of judges based on a video and personal interview centered on this year's theme, "Pioneer Spirit — Pioneer Strong!" Their goals, accomplishments, poise, leadership, community service, and being a direct descendant of a Utah pioneer who came to the Salt Lake Valley between 1847 and May 10, 1869, were other qualifications.

PIONEER MEMORIAL MUSEUM TURNS 75!

The **Pioneer Memorial Museum**, which stands tall and proud on Capitol Hill in Salt Lake City, is the headquarters of International Society Daughters of Utah Pioneers. Dedicated on July 24, 1950, the façade and interior were designed to look like the Salt Lake Theatre, which was torn down in 1929. The original curtain from the theatre hangs on the north wall of the Main Floor. The 75th Anniversary of the Pioneer Memorial Museum will be held on July 24, in conjunction with the annual Open House from 11:00 am until 2:00 pm.

In 1897, the fiftieth anniversary of the first pioneers coming to the Valley was celebrated with the Pioneer Jubilee Semi-Centennial. Five days of activities were held, A Relic Hall displayed artifacts from the pioneers. The sum of \$3,500 was appropriated for the construction of the temporary building on the southwest corner of South Temple and Main Streets. The building, which was modeled after the Parthenon in Athens, held hundreds of artifacts and attracted enthusiastic crowds.

In 1903, a relic hall in a twelve-by-fourteen-foot room in the basement of the LDS Church Tithing Office in Salt Lake City was established. The relics were displayed in a large cabinet bookcase that once belonged to Brigham Young. The collections were later moved to the Lion House, the Deseret Museum, and finally the recently completed Capitol Building. By 1929, it was reported that the DUP had twenty-seven cases of artifacts on display at the Capitol.

Around 1910, the DUP women began fundraising for their own permanent museum. After years of working with the legislature and considerable debate, a triangular shaped piece of land at the head of Main Street was set aside in 1936. Fundraising continued during the Great Depression and World War II with hopes of the completion of the museum coinciding with the pioneer centennial in 1947. A lawsuit over taxpayer funds delayed the project for three years.

The Carriage House, which houses Brigham Young's 1847 wagon and other significant artifacts was made possible through the estate of Sara Marie Van Dyke, a daughter of a Utah pioneer. It was dedicated on October 6, 1973.

According to Museum Curator Kari Main, the Pioneer Memorial Museum is often referred to as "Utah's Attic," a term that DUP wholeheartedly embraces. We invite you to visit this collection of more than 50,000 artifacts and 2,000 pioneer portraits that tell the story of a unique group of stalwart people who played a significant role in taming the West. KEEP IT OR NOT? WHAT TO KEEP AT THE END OF THE DUP YEAR

Company or Camp Secretaries should sort and permanently keep in a file folder: minutes, officer lists, Annual Statistical and Financial Reports, Membership Dues Summary Sheets, and Camp Rosters.

Whether or not to keep scrapbooks is for local leadership to decide. If discarding, review and pull-out documents, such as Camp Charters or histories of Company or Camp. Scrapbooks may be donated to local historical societies or DUP satellite museums, or scanned and kept in digital form then discarded. International does not have space or manpower to handle Company or Camp materials unless scanned into one digital file and submitted to: membership@isdup.org. That digital file would then be attached in the membership database to the appropriate Company or Camp.

Historians may have a collection of pioneer histories. Compare them to the International collection before discarding. The Index of pioneer histories is found at isdup.org > History Department tab > Pioneer Index.

Company or Camp financial records of income and expenditures should be kept for seven years. Bank statements are kept for two years. This need not be in paper form if accessible online at a bank.



THE EDWIN AND LEAH OAKLEY SMOUT LOG CABIN DEDICATION

After a decade of laborious work, which included herding the cows out of the cabin, negotiating with Marriott-Slaterville City, rebuilding the cabin with a north side, adding a new roof, doors and windows, two moves, and furnishing with artifacts from the original cabin, the Edwin and Leah Oakley Smout log cabin was dedicated on June 1, 2024.

The cabin was originally built by Stanford Bingham on Mound Fort Hill. In 1856, the Smouts purchased the cabin and moved it to their lot in Ogden City. In 1859, they purchased a farm in Slaterville, Weber County, Utah, from Johnathan Browning and moved the cabin there. Edwin and Leah Smout raised eleven children in this cabin and built a modern home around the entire cabin in 1882.

Thanks to **Jean Hodson Branch**, of the Susan Marriott Camp, Weber North East Company, Marriott-Slaterville, Utah, who headed up the restoration as the Director of the Satellite Museum. Her committee consisted of: Marilyn and Ren Meyerhoffer, Patsy and Fred Hunt, Annette Christensen, Peggy Bushell, and Robyn Schofield, with Noreen Horning and Sherry Morris, posthumously.

Two days of celebration were held at the cabin location at 1570 West 400 North. One was held for the DUP members (140 attended) and one for the community (80 attended).

The committee hopes that the cabin will memorialize the sacrifice that their ancestors made in coming to the valley of the mountains to begin a new life.






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WHERE IS THIS PIONEER HOME?
