









## First Marker Sent To England By DUP



Plaque showing departure of LDS converts to Zion is displayed by Mrs. Kate B. Carter of DUP.

A heavy bronze marker, first ever to be sent to the Old World by the Daughters of UTah Pioneers, has been air expressed to Birmingham, England, iT denotes the departure of the first Saints from England to Zion.

Mrs. Kate B. Carter, DUP president, said the plaque being sent to President Joy Dunyon of the Centrap British Mission of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and will be placed on the LDS Church in Birmingham.

Dedication will be held sometime in late April or early May

Mrs. Carter said the plaque was sent at the request of Church members there and that the DUP is hoping other missions will ask for markers telling the story of the first immigrants from their land.

The Birmingham marker tells of the arrival of the first LDS missionaries on July 20, 1837 the organization of branches and the departure June 6, 1840 of 41 Saints from England "the first of many thousands who emigrated from England to Zion between 1840-1869.

" The marker is the 317th to be placed by the DUP at historic sites.






