**VEYO CAMP VISITS DUP MARKER #215
IN PINE VALLEY**

The **Veyo Camp**, Washington West Company, in Veyo, Utah, held their March 2026 meeting and then concluded the day with an enjoyable trip to nearby Pine Valley to visit and care for DUP Marker #215 “Pine Valley Settlement” located at 1179 East Main Street, Pine Valley, Utah.

Lisa Stewart, Veyo Camp Historian, led a discussion describing the early settlers and how Pine Valley came to be the beautiful city that is enjoyed by many. She explained how the valley was discovered by Isaac Riddle, an Indian Missionary, while searching for a lost cow. The first sawmill south of the rim of the Great Basin was built on this site in 1855-1856 by Robert Richey, Jeru Blackburn, and Isaac Riddle.

Kathy Foster, Veyo Camp Second Vice Captain and Pine Valley resident, described the devastation from the 2025 fires that destroyed 13 homes and much of the Pine Valley Recreational Area. The group visited the Pine Valley Chapel and Bishop’s Storehouse, also located on Main Street, and enjoyed a box lunch provided by Kittryn Butt, Veyo resident and DUP daughter.

UNION PIONEER CEMETERY CLEAN UP

Eleven members of the Cottonwood Heights Youth City Council and their leaders, Ann and Scott Bracken, donated their time and energy to remove overgrown vines from the north fence of the Union Pioneer Memorial Cemetery in Cottonwood Heights, Utah, to help preserve the site’s appearance and historical integrity. This cemetery is the oldest officially registered cemetery in Utah.

The workers arrived armed with gloves and tools and cleared thick vegetation that had begun to damage the fencing. Their efforts significantly improved the area and reduced the risk of long-term structural deterioration.

The students talked about teamwork; they saw what needed to be done and got to work. All the debris was bagged and removed from the site. They did a professional job, and the **Salt Lake Far South East Company** praises the council members for their service and dedication.

MADISON COMPANY PARTICIPATES IN REXBURG, IDAHO, FOUNDERS' DAY FAIR

On March 14, 2026, The Rexburg Historical Society sponsored a Founders' Day Fair celebrating the 1883 founding of Rexburg, Idaho. The **Madison Company**, in Rexburg, Idaho, sponsored a booth at this celebration. On display at their booth were pioneer era artifacts, as well as materials about Daughters of Utah Pioneers and how to become a member of the organization. Several women expressed an interest and have received applications.

A highlight of the display was a large pictorial display of all eleven DUP Markers throughout Madison County, Idaho. Vice-President over Outreach, Peggy Rogers, created a scavenger hunt with addresses to all the Marker locations. Each location had a box where visitors could sign after visiting the site. Many people took the address information to use as a possible Family Home Evening activity. An elementary school teacher also took the information for her fourth-grade class as part of their study of Idaho history.

The Company enjoyed sharing information about the Daughters of Utah Pioneers organization with people from the Rexburg area and felt that it was a very worthwhile activity.

SALT LAKE FAR SOUTH WEST COMPANY REDEDICATES DROWNE CABIN MARKER

On Monday, March 30, the **Salt Lake Far South West Company** rededicated Marker #39 "The Drowne Log Cabin" in Midvale, Utah. The cabin was constructed in 1866 by the William and Sarah Bennett family and was one of the first houses built in the area that would become Midvale. David Drowne helped cut and haul logs from Big Cottonwood Canyon. When the Bennetts built and moved into a brick home in 1868, they gave the cabin to the Drowne family who raised ten children in the small home. The Daughters of Utah Pioneers was given the cabin in 1936, and it was moved to Midvale City Park. The Glover Camp restored and rededicated it in 1976. When a portion of the park was sold, the City moved the cabin and marker to its present location which is land that was originally owned by Harmon Cutler where a family cemetery was located. It became known as the Cutler Hill Pioneer Cemetery. Bingham Junction Camp assumed the responsibility for the cabin and marker when Glover Camp was disbanded.

In 2013 construction began on a residential area surrounding the cabin and the monument and marker were removed to prevent damage. The cabin suffered some ground-water damage, so many volunteers helped with the restoration by adding two new base logs, a new door, new chinking, a new roof, and a new foundation and floor. Finally, a new monument was built, and Marker #39 was replaced. Members of Bingham Junction Camp, International and Company boards, as well as the Midvale City Council and the mayor attended the rededication. The dedicatory prayer was offered by Paul Glover, whose ancestors were some of the original settlers in the area.

REVITALIZING TRIBUTE BENCHES AND HONORARY DUP ROCK MONUMENT

The **Gale City Camp**, Malheur Company, in Western Idaho and Eastern Oregon, commissioned Rod Frahm to build and install seven benches with DUP marker plates about two decades ago. The benches were placed in area cemeteries and parks throughout Nyssa, Parma, Ontario, Vale, and Payette.

The intent of the tribute benches was to provide people with a place to sit and reflect. The benches were patterned after the DUP bench that sits on the grounds of the Boise Temple. While researching specific locations of these benches, local DUP members discovered a rock monument that was erected

in 1968 with a bronze plate noting it as Marker #352 "New Plymouth." It lists the names of pioneers who impacted the founding of New Plymouth, Idaho, in Payette County.

All these structures are maintained by Malheur Company/Gate City Camp, and it was apparent that they all needed attention and care after so many years. In response, the DUP created teams of members to revitalize the benches and their rock monument for the first time since they were built. The benches were cleaned and conditioned, the rusting ironworks were spray painted, and the unreadable dedication plates were replaced. The rock monument was also cleaned and polished.

The Company members took great pride in revitalizing the tribute benches and monument. It was a joy to provide the time and attention needed to renew them in honor of past and present members, as well as the pioneers who settled in the Malheur area. This project also spurred the idea to expand the tribute by considering the installation of two more benches in area cemeteries.

MARTIN HARRIS CAMP ATTENDS TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

As December 2025 rolled in, daughters of Lindon **Curly Springs Camp**, Utah North Center Company, in Lindon, Utah, decided to give this treasured piece of Lindon's pioneer past a new kind of life. For a few magical evenings in December, this quiet old home became Santa's very special Lindon workshop. Children and parents alike wandered up to the historic house with lights lining the sidewalk and stepped inside to warm greetings from Santa Claus himself. Inside the Harris home visitors found a Christmas tree decorated with pinecones, chestnuts, dried oranges, and cloth Scandinavian stars. Santa sat and talked to each child, posed for pictures, and handed out old-fashioned treats. Families took photos that would forever link their memories with Lindon's past. By the time Christmas Day approached, the house, already rich in nineteenth-century history, had become a place where past and present met in laughter, stories, and holiday cheer. Everyone agreed that Santa's stay in Lindon had made this historic home feel more alive and beloved than ever.

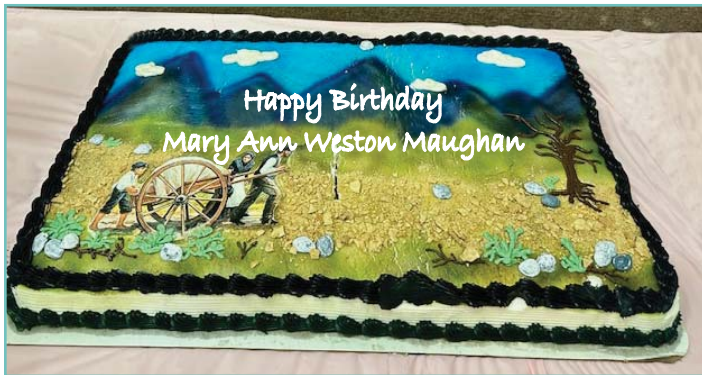
Lela was recently honored during the 5,000th episode of "Music & the Spoken Word." She sang with the world-renowned Tabernacle Choir/The Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square from 1965 to 1987 and was recognized as the oldest living emeritus member during the episode. Music has been an integral part of Lela's life. She has played the piano for 65 years, produced an introductory piano program and has spent decades directing choirs of all sizes, including a "Four Hundred Voices" Choir. Lela has also written a book, *The Spirit of Music: A Missionary Tool*, which shares some of the history of the Tabernacle Choir.

“Birthing Babies in Cache Valley from 1856 to 2026” was the theme of the **Cache North Company** Meeting in Logan, Utah, on Monday, March 2, 2026. Mary Ann was the first woman to drive her own covered wagon into Cache Valley being eight months pregnant and gave birth to the first baby in the valley just two weeks later. She became a midwife and helped birth hundreds of other babies, along with achieving many other pioneering accomplishments.

The daughters also learned about the many different resources available to pregnant women in the valley today, including the newly opened Cache Valley Birth Center, and the Pregnancy Resource Center of Cache Valley.

A special birthday cake was served by the Mary Ann Weston Maughan Camp in her honor, as March was her birthday month.

LILY OF THE VALLEY CAMP MARKS 125TH DUP BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

The quilt, preserved and displayed by JaNeen Hales, reflects the unity and dedication of early Camp members whose efforts helped secure the granary as the camp’s permanent home.
